Hello Bethel!! I recently was asked once again if there is a reason the bunny is part of Easter and if there is any Christian connection. I remember sharing this article with you a few years ago and thought it might be fun to revisit it in light of the many changes and challenges in our current world.

The History Of The Easter Bunny

"Go to sleep now, so the Easter Bunny can come." This is said to Christian children around the world on the night before Easter. Children look forward to Easter and the treats that come with it, especially chocolate eggs and other treats that will be in Easter baskets, delivered by the Easter Bunny. Perhaps the Easter Bunny scatters eggs throughout the house or yard to be found in an Easter egg hunt. Maybe brightly decorated eggs are used in an Easter egg roll, like the one held each year on the White House lawn. Occasionally, a lucky child will be given a live Easter Bunny as a special Easter gift.

Each family may have a unique tradition, but the basic concept is the same; if you've been good, the Easter Bunny will bring a special treat to celebrate Easter, which for Christians celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. How did the Easter Bunny and Easter eggs come to represent the resurrection? The answer is found not in modern day commercialism but much farther back than Jesus, and was then used by Christians to preach the good news.

To discover the history of the Easter Bunny, you must travel back in time to pagan worship. Babylonians, 2000 years before Christ, worshiped a god named Tammuz. Tammuz, the Babylonians believed, was resurrected from the dead by Ishtar, the symbol for which was a rabbit. The festival commemorating this resurrection was celebrated in the spring. Fathers helped children paint designs on eggs. The eggs would be hidden so the children could enjoy an egg hunt. All members of the family got dressed in their best clothes to attend a worship service.

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How did it become a part of celebrations in Christian families? The answer is really quite simple. Christian missionaries, starting with Paul, were not afraid to use regional or cultural religious symbols to help explain the Gospel. An example would be Paul's discourse at the Areopagus (Acts 17:16) in ancient Greece, when he explained to the people that their tribute to the unknown God was actually the one true God as he presented the Gospel to them.

In the case of the rabbit and the egg, both were used in many different societies, as in ancient Babylon, to represent rebirth and the renewal of life. Christian missionaries would use these familiar symbols to help portray and communicate the Gospel and bring people into a relationship with Christ. Over time the Easter Rabbit and the Easter egg, as well as the word "Easter" (which is not found in the bible) became linked with the resurrection of Jesus Christ."

I thought the article above might be an interesting tidbit to chew on for good brain food. The modern church faces the challenge of how to transition from our pre-Covid reality, through our present Covid reality, and into our post-Covid reality. Traditions are still present, but are being redefined. There is a whole lot of 'new' that has been added to the old, out of necessity. I anticipate that as we emerge, we will continue to build on the adaptations we have made in this past year.

Without a doubt, this past year has been a challenge. We've seen much change in our society, our local communities, and our church as we reinvented worship and fellowship in trying times that have limited and sometimes prevented us from being together.

Yet we have found ways to stay connected to each other, and ways to be the body of Christ to one another. We have connected to each other in very new ways, both virtually and in person. We've grown in so many ways through this adversity, using the various new secular norms and technology available to us. Amazingly, the word went out: we've reached people from all over the world, and we have people from all over the country who attend church at Bethel via livestream each Sunday. Who would've thunk it!!

We've also kept an active role in service and mission. We just sent another 700 pounds of food to Mason Dixon. We are actively beginning to plan for a gradual reopening of the church as we begin to emerge from this pandemic. It is a powerful reminder that through trial, we grow. As we continue follow the ministry and journey of the incarnate Christ manifested for us in the Holy Spirit this Lenten season, may we never cease to be amazed by the faithfulness of God!

This is the whole reason for the incarnation (God with us) and the resurrection (God never leaving us). Through our faith in Christ as Lord, we have a God who chooses to be with us always, to work alongside us through the presence of the Holy Spirit, and to lift our burdens. If God has done this for us, may we continue to have the strength to do it for each other.

While Bethel cemetery is not an official *Wreaths Across America* site, the Troop followed their service closely, timing the ceremony with other events across the world so that all would participate in this remembrance in unison.

Thirty-four Scouts and many more leaders and adults gathered for this solemn event. Two wreaths were presented: one for the fallen heroes resting in the cemetery; the other for those who did not come home. A flag-raising to half-staff showed honor and respect for those who we remember.

Each name of all 124 veterans in the Bethel cemetery was read by the Assistant Senior Patrol Leaders, and a moment of silence was offered to them.

Troop 265 is glad that this opportunity happened. COVID, which has significantly impacted our lifestyle, allowed us to hold this event instead of a larger veteran cemetery event. Through this event, we learned about the heroes in our community dating back to the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812.




Pause for Poetry
